I.11 Early medieval literature and its contexts (English Tripos Part I, Paper 10)

Timetabled teaching: Lecture series in Michaelmas Term 'Medieval Literary Styles' (Dr M E J Hughes); Lecture series in Lent Term 2012 'Post-Conquest Literature' (Professor Windeatt and Others); Latin language (optional) teaching in MT by Dr Neil Wright; Middle English (optional) with Dr M E J Hughes in MT and Anglo-Norman (optional) in LT with Prof B Windeatt. Typical pattern of supervisions: Literature supervisions (approximately) MT 2, LT 6, ET 2, in groups of 2-4. Plus up to 6 language classes (Early Middle English, Medieval Latin or Anglo-Norman options) in groups of up to 10 (across MT and LT).

I.12 French literature before 1300

Paper co-ordinator: Miranda Griffin (mhg11@cm.ac.uk)

Initial meeting: with supervisor

Timetabled teaching: nine lectures per term, with additional seminar meetings in Lent and Easter terms. In addition, there are four classes at the beginning of Michaelmas term to introduce students to reading Old French.

The commentary section of the exam and the section on individual authors and texts are covered during supervisions; the special topic ('The postcolonial Middle Ages') is covered in four seminars, to which 10-12 students are assigned and at which some 4-6 students make oral presentations.

Students may opt to submit a portfolio of essays in place of the exam for this paper. The portfolio consists of six essays, showing broad coverage of the field, of which three are marked and must conform to the rubric of the exam (i.e., one essay on the special topic; one essay on a text, author or genre; one commentary)

Typical pattern of supervisions: 3-4 supervisions per term, plus two on commentaries just before the exam (if the student is taking the exam).
